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FROM DREAM TO DISASTER: COULD YOUR TINY HOUSE BE UNINSURABLE?

The allure of tiny house living is growing in New Zealand, but so is the necessity of being proactive about its unique challenges. One such aspect that might escape notice until it's too late is insurance. In a landscape where tiny houses are more than just homes—they are dreams on wheels—ensuring these dreams are protected is paramount. Here's what you need to know.

Is It a House or a Caravan?

If it's a house in the insurer's eyes, it needs the necessary consents: fixed foundations and either

a code of compliance or certificate of acceptance. Do remember that a house insurance policy won't cover towing. If you're relocating your tiny home, you will also need transportation insurance.

However, for most mobile tiny homes, caravan insurance might be your best option—even if you never intend to hitch it up and drive away.

Be Mindful of These Two Key Points:

DIY Builds May Not Qualify: If your tiny house is a labor of love, built by you, it might be trickier to insure. Many providers only cover professionally built tiny homes. However, there are exceptions but always get these in writing.

Environmental Responsibility

Offcuts of plywood from the build were donated to local schools for birdhouse projects, waste was sorted and recycled, and smaller pieces of timber were provided to locals for DIY projects. The result? Less than 1 cubic meter of rubbish generated during construction.

A dedicated area for a table between the lounge and kitchen, along with a kitchen designed to accommodate a full-size table, ensures that hosting dinner parties is a breeze. The tiny home also boasts a wrap-around deck and two sliding doors, seamlessly connecting the indoors with the outdoors. This design creates an ideal setting for entertaining while soaking in the stunning views of New Zealand's scenic beauty.

We all know flush toilets. They are what you find in almost all traditional homes. However, it is relatively rare to find these toilets in tiny houses, mainly because it requires connecting to the wastewater system, which comes with consent issues.

Generally speaking, flush toilets are only an option for those tiny houses built to meet building and resource consent requirements and are attached to local services. However, since this is becoming a more common scenario, it's worth looking at flush toilets. But, before you choose this as your toileting solution, ensure you fully understand what's involved in building a tiny house that can get building and resource consent.

THE ADVANTAGES OF FLUSH TOILETS IN A TINY HOUSE


- **Familiarity:** Standard flush toilets are widely used and familiar to most individuals, making them comfortable and easy to operate.




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
